Be Safe, Be Kind, Be The Best That You Can Be Early Years and Primary Learning

The children in the nursery have made a wonderful start to the year. They have had fun exploring through lots of lovely messy play and are settling happily into their new environment.

In Maths, Reception have been learning to subitise. Subitising is looking at a group of objects and saying how many objects there are without counting them. We have practiced doing this with one, two and three objects. Class 1 have been continuing to explore their senses. This week we had an experiment to see what the class's favourite smell was. After the children made their own pictograms about the sense of taste. They went around asking their friends to vote for their favourite food. Class 1 have also been starting to use cursive handwriting for some letters and have been encouraged to use their cursive writing when writing in sentences.



Class 2 have been learning how to compare different amounts of objects. We have been doing this by using greater than, less than and equal to symbols. In English we have started writing our Jack and the Baked Beanstalk story whilst also making it our own by adding in adjectives, conjunctions and also adding in completely new sentences.

In Class 3 we have been really focusing in English on using powerful language, including ambitious verbs and interesting expanded noun phrases. We really enjoyed deciding which verbs were our favourites and how we could use these in our work.

Invertebrate vs Vertebrate





This week Class 4 have been investigating which liquids cause the most and least damage to our teeth. We have used egg shells to represent the tooth enamel and placed them in different liquids including cola, orange juice and milk. We have been observing any changes to the egg shell and monitoring them over the week.

Class 5 have had another successful week publishing their descriptive narratives and developing a greater understanding of how to use personification and metaphor in creative writing. In Maths, they have focused on developing different strategies to add and subtract large numbers. They have also had the pleasure of welcoming a new pupil. Well done for all your hard work this week Class 5!

This week in Class 6, we have been working on our science topic about classifying different animals.

We have learnt how all animals can be classified as vertebrates or invertebrates depending on their characteristics. The major groups of vertebrates are fish, mammals, reptiles, birds and amphibians.
