# Minibeast of the Month





In Nursery this week, children have enjoyed listening to What the Ladybird heard and singing the song Old Macdonald had a Farm. They were introduced to lots of farmyard animals as well as two men called Lanky Len and Hefty Hugh. They drew maps to show the route the men took when they tried to steal the prize cow!

In Reception this week we have been practising our concentration and perseverance whilst learning how to sew. Well done everyone!







Class 1 have started a new science topic on plants. As a class we have planted some peas and herbs and we are looking forward to observing their progress. Our new English book is Where the Wild Things Are. We have started describing the new characters with some exciting adjectives.

This week in Class 2, we have started reading our new text in English called 'Tell Me a Dragon' by Jackie Morris. We have then imagined and drawn our own dragons such as a fire dragon, an ice dragon or a rainbow dragon. Following this, we have used water colours to paint our dragons in their habitats. In maths, we have been learning to make arrays and identifying the repeated addition and multiplication sentences to match the arrays.







This week in Class 3 we have been exploring shadows as part of our Light unit. We carried out an experiment to find out how the length of shadows change throughout the day, learning that when the sun is lower in the sky, the shadows are longer! We also made our own puppets and used torches to create shadows on the walls and ceiling. It was great to see the children so focused and learning practically. Well done to all the children for settling into the summer term so quickly.

Class 4 have had an excellent start to the summer term. In English, they have begun reading 'Gorilla', developing their inference skills in order to understand the message behind each illustration. In Maths, they have continued to tackle fractions with determination and vigour as well as honing their multiplication skills in preparation for the times table test in June. Well done Year 4!
